Proud families and loved ones filled the bleachers in support of the graduates, who formed a black and white sea of gowns and custom-decorated caps as they took their seats to the tune of "Pomp and Circumstance."

Following the Pledge of Allegiance and "The Star-Spangled Banner," Principal Raymond Williams greeted all in attendance and encouraged the graduates to continue striving to achieve great things and be the best they can be. Graduates, you must always continue to dig deeper and discover gifts you never knew you had."

Board of Education Vice President Kevin Carroll and Hicksville Public Schools Hall of Fame inductee Timothy Myers addressed the seniors and audience members as well.

Also addressing the students was Legislator Rose Marie Walker, a Hicksville resident with deep roots in the school district. "Always remember to look at those less fortunate than you and to give of yourselves," she said.

Niculescu thanked his family
members, teachers and classmates.
He acknowledged that he and
his peers will be on their own for

Dr. Carl Bonuso as SUPERINTENDENT

Hicksville Public Schools welcomes Dr. Carl Bonuso, who served as interim superintendent of schools for the 2014-15 school year, as superintendent.

At its April meeting, the Board of Education voted unanimously to appoint Dr. Bonuso to the post, effective July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2018.

"I am grateful to the Board of Education for the confidence they have expressed in me to serve as [the] next superintendent of schools," said Dr. Bonuso. "During these past few months as interim superintendent, I have had the privilege and pleasure of working closely with the Board of Education, administrators, staff, students, parents and community residents and experiencing firsthand the professionalism and daily commitment to doing what is in the best interest of our children. I look forward to continuing to work together on behalf of the children we love, support and serve."

Prior to joining the Hicksville School District, Dr. Bonuso served as superintendent of the Wantagh School District and as interim superintendent of the Sag Harbor School District. Dr. Bonuso is an award-winning veteran administrator and educator and has been a guiding force in educational excellence and collaborative leadership. He is a well-known and highly recognized educator and has written numerous articles on topics ranging from "School/Business Partnerships," to the "Image of a Leader," which appeared in journals such as Kappan, Psychology Today and Today's Education. He has



led training workshops and presented both locally and nationally in areas such as the new APPR mandates, effective schools research, creating a positive work environment, effective supervision of instruction and shared leadership/decision-making. In addition, Dr. Bonuso has served as an adjunct professor at Dowling College and Stony Brook University and is the former editor-in-chief of the highly regarded peer-reviewed journal, Long Island Educational Review.

"During the past several months, as the search process unfolded, it became increasingly evident that Dr. Bonuso possessed the superior qualities that the Board of Education was seeking to lead the Hicksville School District and its students to the next level of excellence," said Board of Education President Phil Heckler. "As interim superintendent, Dr. Bonuso clearly embraced our community as his own and demonstrated through his professional leadership, vision and commitment to our goals that he is without a doubt the unanimous choice of the Board of Education as our next superintendent of schools."

The district hosted its first Talent for the Troops program at the high school on June 3 and raised more than \$10,000 for the Wounded Warrior Project, a nonprofit organization that offers programs and services for wounded military veterans.


ops Nets \$10K BOE RECOGNIZES SUCCESS
